ANA ETHICS AND SOCIAL JUSTICE

 - Provision 8 Nurses' Role in Ethics and Human Rights
 - Duty to Advocate, guide understanding, and promote for individuals in marginalized and vulnerable populations.

- Less access to healthy living conditions. (Conyers et al., 2021)


MEDIA
